	It is my hope that all of you will come to my extra help sessions after school to discuss topics, projects, other concerns or practice skills. What happens in the formal classroom setting should be dedicated to the exploration of the content. Email works very well to get in touch with me and is a very efficient communication tool for brief questions. In the cases where your questions require lengthy responses or some discussion, it is best to come see me.
Course Description:	Are you passionate about making videos? Are you the member of your friend group that always has their phone or camera in their hand? Have a story to tell? Are you looking to be the next YouTube or social media star? Have you started experimenting with editing via iMovie or Final Cut Pro? In this course, students will learn to tell their stories through video. Students learn how to use professional camera equipment to set up and record interviews, stand ups, B-roll, and more. Students will then learn how to edit their footage using Adobe Premiere. Their final projects will be shown online and broadcast on WCA-TV. We will also examine pre-production, production, and post-production techniques through a mixture of screenings, discussion, and hands-on exercises.
Course Objectives:	Students will develop and conceptualize multiple digital video productions. Students will learn research skills and conduct research to found their productions. Students will conduct on location interviews, shoot video, and record sound. Students will learn to communicate effectively telling a story through digital video editing. Students will produce and publish their own digital video productions.
Class Participation:	Contrary to what some students may wish or believe, you should not and will not pass merely by attending class every day. The furniture in this room does that, and yet none of it has a high school diploma. Digital Video Making involves a team effort, with each team member contributing. Every student is expected to be a full-fledged participant in this class. That includes arriving on time to all class sessions and engaging fully in class discussions and exercises. Your assigned projects will be reviewed in class, and you will be expected to accept and give constructive comment. You will learn from honest, thoughtful critiques, and you will be expected to provide the same to your colleagues. Disingenuous flattery doesn't help anyone. If you work hard and do your best, you will pass this class. The people who fail are the ones who do not complete their work or slap it together at the last minute without following the directions or putting forth any effort. Please do your bestI want everyone to succeed.
Attendance:	Attendance is an essential component to this class and <i>WILL</i> be taken into consideration when calculating your class grade.

"I" Score: (Integrity Grade)

<u>Integrity</u> is defined as "the practice of being honest and showing a consistent and uncompromising adherence to strong moral, ethical principles, and values. In ethics, integrity is regarded as the honesty and truthfulness or accuracy of one's actions."

It goes without saying that the best communicators, broadcasters, and students all demonstrate the highest form of INTEGRITY. However, how does one quantify integrity in a number? Throughout this document you will see a multitude of expectations that define integrity in my courses. Above you have read my expectations for participation and attendance, and below you will read even more expectations. For the purposes of your grade in this course you will earn between 0-6 points for each class meeting which will constitute your daily "I" Score. This course requires you to function both independently and as part of a team. You will also be expected to uphold the highest principals of integrity while engaging in activities which I directly lead and those that are student-centered.

Ask yourself, have I given my best effort throughout this class period? Have I demonstrated my integrity, both when Mr. Robbins was looking and when he had his back turned? Am I giving my best with what I have been asked to do? If you answer "YES," you have earned a full (6) points for that class period. If the answer is 1/3, 2/3, or "sometimes," then it will be up to my judgement to determine whether you earn Zero points, (2) points, or (4) points for that class meeting. <u>Unexcused absences</u> will be recorded as a <u>ZERO</u> for your "I" Score for that class period. <u>Unexcused tardiness</u> for class will also result in a point(s) deduction. In addition to enforcement of school policy regarding <u>unauthorized use of a device</u> (i.e. cellphone, computer, tablet, etc.): texting, phone call, computer game, online game, etc. will result in an automatic <u>ZERO</u> for your "I" Score for that class period.

Students "I" Scores will be posted to PowerSchool for each week, with total points adjusted for the number of class meetings in that week. Details below:

"I" Score = 6-points per class period (earned per 1/3 of class period)

Daily "I" Score Possibilities = 0, 2, 4, 6

Average (5) Classes per Week = Your Total out of 30-points per week

Average Term = 9 Weeks = Your Total out of ~270-points per term = ~540-points per semester.

Professional Dress Policy:

Reporters are no different from representatives of other organizations. If they are badly or inappropriately dressed, it can affect the impression they make and the results they get. When going on-air or representing our school and class at interviews and events, dress in a manner that fits the situation and shows respect for the event, interviewee, or the situation. Flip-flops and scruffy shirts are out. So are revealing necklines and bare midriffs. And never wear a large advertisement during an interview or other on-air assignment—not even a WHS sweatshirt.

Class Materials:

Organization is an *ESSENTIAL* component to the successful completion of this course. The following are REQUIRED.

• Writing Utensils (pen or pencil) – required for every class and will NOT be provided by the instructor at any time
• Paper/Notepad – required for every class and will NOT be provided by the instructor at any time

Homework:

Although an elective course, expect to receive homework **FREQUENTLY**. You should anticipate homework, as well as, a number of independent, out-of-school assignments throughout the course.

NO LATE HOMEWORK WILL BE ACCEPTED, however, if you are absent from class, you should make arrangements with the instructor to acquire the work that you missed from class IMMEDIATELY upon your return to school. You will have one school day per day that you were absent to make up your missing work (ex: if you are absent on Monday and Tuesday, you will have until Thursday of the same

	week to complete your makeup work, otherwise, work will not be accepted).
	As this is not a traditional class model, homework will be more than a simple check for understanding of class materials. Instead, homework will be crucial preparation of materials for broadcasts during your assigned class period. Assignments should be complete upon arrival to class each day.
Makeup work:	Please approach the instructor before/after class, or afterschool if you would like me to give you information about what you missed during an absence. Remember that it is your responsibility to contact the instructor when you return to school from an absence. The instructor will NOT chase you around to give you your assignments.
Current Events:	A major responsibility of every journalist is to keep abreast of the day's news. One of the core aspects of this course is to engage students in current events, and have students understand their connection to the news. It will be students' task to "use the news" and develop proficient news reading skills and an awareness of current events.
Reflective Writing:	Self-reflection, critical analysis, and organization are an important component of the broadcast development process. Students will be asked to complete reflective writing assignments via Google Classroom. The assignments are intended to provide a structured opportunity to thoughtfully consider all aspects in the process of production.
Projects:	The majority of your grade will be comprised of projects that will be assigned over the course of this class. Projects will be expected to be completed on deadline as would be expected of any professional journalist. Broadcast projects will be graded by the instructor using a rubric which you will receive prior to the deadline.
Academic Integrity:	Each student in this course is expected to abide a personal code of academic integrity. Any work submitted by students in this course for academic credit will be the students' own work.
	Plagiarism of any kind is strictly prohibited. Plagiarism is defined as taking ideas from another and passing them off as one's own. It is a serious violation of Watertown High School's policy on academic integrity. Should plagiarism occur, students will automatically receive a zero for the assignment and be referred to the administration for further disciplinary action.
General Expectations:	#1: Please be on time to class. Attendance and punctuality are important, and I will NOT wait to begin the day's lesson.

Grades:	All assignments in Digital Media & Communications will be graded on a points system. The bigger the assignment, the more points it will be worth. Major projects will use rubric grading systems. Your letter grade will be based on the number of points you earn. If you earn 10 points out of 10 possible points, you have 100%. 9 out of 10 is a 90%, etc. All grades will be posted on <i>PowerSchool Student/Parent Portal</i> students and parents can access and log-in at any time (Instructions for using PowerSchool are located on my website http://www.mrrobbinsdmc.com).
